Staying the course through challenging times

A year ago, La Alianza Hispana was immersed in developing a strategic plan. We were actively engaging with new partners and investors to expand our reach to Boston area Latinos. We were putting in place mechanisms to measure our impact with our clients and strengthen our organizational capacity. It was also the time of year that Board Member Kendra Chencus took her first steps to train for the 2008 Boston Marathon, running and fundraising for La Alianza Hispana.

Running the Boston Marathon has become an inspiring metaphor for us at La Alianza Hispana in 2008. Last April, as I was cheering on our first ever Boston Marathon Team, I found myself in awe of the runners. I reflected upon what it took to get them to that moment. I believe it takes this:

- You need a disciplined plan that includes foreseeing challenging environments;
- A can-do, "Si Se Puede" attitude is a must;
- You need people who believe in you along the way; and
- It takes courage to take the first steps towards

I find this to be true whether it be the first steps towards a 26.2 mile journey or, as you will read in this 2008 Year in Review, the first steps towards a journey as a new mother, a new immigrant, or a community activist. Today I am pleased to share with you that La Alianza Hispana has become an increasingly "fit" organization in 2008. We made a positive impact on the Greater Boston Latino community by focusing on leading socio-economic factors and using proven culturally specific program models and delivery methods. Our programs and services reached the heart of the Greater Boston Latino community and are the starting point and ongoing resource for success. This year 2,000 people were served through direct services and 13,000 attended our Latino Health Festival.

In this 2008 Year in Review, I am pleased to share highlights from the last year. I'm thrilled to introduce you to our new strategic partners, investors and board members who bring resources and expertise to our efforts. La Alianza Hispana's 2008 Program Overview

Since 1971, La Alianza Hispana has brought hope to well over 30,000 Bostonians. As a hub of social service delivery, advocacy and education, our organization has changed lives and changed the landscape of community resources.

In 2008, we approached our work in collaboration with others to ensure the greatest impact and success. We launched new, cost-effective initiatives to address pressing socio-economic challenges. Some of these program highlights include:

- In response to growing youth violence in the Dudley Square area, we launched a Girls'
 Development Group targeted to at-risk Latinas. We were able to activate this group thanks to the
 generous pilot project funding from Anna B. Stearns Foundation and the Amelia
 Peabody Foundation.
- More than 13,000 people attended our 2nd Annual Latino Health Festival. We expanded our
 work with our national partner, Celebra La Vida Con Salud and with Mayor Thomas M.
 Menino and the City of Boston's Office of Arts, Tourism and Special Events. This
 year we engaged Planned Parenthood of Massachusetts and Boston Public Health
 Commission, two strategic partners that will help to broaden our impact on reaching Latinos
 with public health services.
- Drawing upon research findings from our partnership with Tufts University and Northeastern University, we enhanced programming for our seniors with an art therapy group and educational workshops which promote good nutrition and mental health.
- We expanded workforce development programs by providing our Workplace English classes onsite at Sterlingwear of Boston.

Over the past three years, La Alianza Hispana has adapted its business approach to address the socioeconomic factors impacting Boston's nonprofit sector. We know the road ahead will present many economic challenges, and we anticipate a big increase in demand for all of our services. In light of recent state and local funding cuts, we are focused on maintaining our current level of programing in the coming year. La Alianza Hispana's Board, executive and administrative leadership is working to ensure that we diversify revenue streams and further develop strategic partnerships in order to preempt the negative impact of the current economic crisis.

La Alianza Hispana's Program Profiles

Mental Health and Public Health Programs



La Alianza Hispana's Mental Health and Public Health Programs focus on good social and emotional health of the Latino families across their life span. La Alianza Hispana offers a wide variety of bilingual/bicultural clinical and supportive services. Our Mental Health Programs include: Crisis Intervention, Family Support and Stabilization Services, Family-Based Therapy, Girls' Development Group and a Parent Mentoring Program. Our Public Health Programs include: Prenatal Health, Celebra La Vida con Salud y Música Latino Health Festival and MassHealth and Commonwealth Cares program, a healthcare outreach and enrollment program for the uninsured and underinsured.

Who we served in 2008:

- Family Stabilization Services intervened with 135 family members
- Over 35 girls enrolled in the Girls' Development Groups
- Parent Mentor services provided comprehensive services to 25 families
- Prenatal Health services engaged 52 new mothers and their children
- More than 700 people received bilingual information about universal healthcare and we enrolled more than 200 in MassHealth & Commonwealth Care
- More than 13,0000 attended our annual Latino Health Festival and accessed free services, medical screening, cultural activities and health-related workshops

Esther's Story: A young mother's journey with La Alianza Hispana



It was a La Alianza Hispana case worker who reached out a helping hand to Esther two years ago. At that time, Esther was 8-months pregnant, living in an emergency shelter, and feeling unsure about her ability to take care of herself, let alone her child. Having just moved to Boston to escape a violent relationship, Esther had never felt more alone in her life. She wasn't sure who to trust or how she was going to manage creating a new life in Boston.

Esther's first step with La Alianza Hispana was to enroll in our Prenatal Health program. Once enrolled, Esther's case worker connected her with universal health insurance and helped her move into more stable housing. Once her basic needs were being met, she entered counseling.

In 2008, Esther enrolled in GED classes and with the support of La Alianza Hispana's staff, has become actively engaged in early childhood development activities with her two-year old daughter, Yaniris.

"I love my daughter to pieces and I want her to have all the support and love I did not experience when I was growing up," said Esther. "La Alianza Hispana has always been there for me, including when I gave birth to my daughter. Now my daughter is curious about everything and loves to visit the agency staff. La Alianza Hispana is helping me raise her the right way. I'm so grateful to have this support as a mother."

Senior Center and Adult Day Health Program




La Alianza Hispana's elder services are helping Latino seniors to age in place and continue living independent lives. We have two programs: a Senior Social and Recreation Center, a program that provides health education, socialization and recreational services to Latino seniors to stay healthy and maintain their independence; and The Adult Day Health Program which provides direct care to elderly Latinos who may require more intensive care because of disabilities.

Who we served in 2008:

- 125 Latino seniors attended socialization groups on an ongoing basis
- 42 Latino seniors and/or persons with disabilities received services daily
- 30 engaged in a specialized Art Therapy Program
- 25 participated in educational workshops offered by the Joslin Diabetes Center, Cambridge Health Alliance and others

<u>Franciso's Story: From a young migrant worker to a senior who is organizing his community</u>



Every morning Francisco opens the doors and welcomes his friends at La Alianza Hispana's Senior Center. For the last 17 years, Francisco has served as a fulltime volunteer helping to organize daily activities and serve meals. In addition he plays a central role in program governance. He helps La Alianza Hispana's management understand the pressing needs of Latino seniors. Francisco has been an active participant in Tufts University's longitudinal research on aging Latinos and has been instrumental in helping La Alianza Hispana develop new programming to address mental health and socio-economic issues facing this population.

In 2008, Francisco expanded his service and advocacy by joining Mayor Menino's Food and Fuel Campaign, an initiative that helps residents and small businesses to address the rising costs of food and fuel during the winter.

It's quite fitting that Francisco is serving Boston by advocating on hunger issues. Providing food for others has always been a important aspect of Francisco's life. As a young sugar cane worker in Puerto Rico, he relocated to the mainland to seek better economic opportunities. As a migrant farm worker, Francisco moved seasonally from Virginia to Florida picking the food that fed generations. Later in life, Francisco's journey led him to Boston where he worked as a cook for an elementary school and a volunteer in his church's soup kitchen. "It was later in life that I learned how to read and write. Before coming to Boston, I didn't have access to educational opportunities. I always wanted to help others -- and mostly I find I can make a difference by making sure people have a voice and don't go hungry."

La Alianza Hispana's Workforce Development and Education Programs



The workforce development and education programs prepare Latinos for the world of work by offering services that enhance basic skills. These programs include: English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL), Workplace English, The Timothy Smith Learning Center, a community computer center with 20 computer stations and La Alianza Hispana After School Program.

Who we served:

- Provided English instruction to 188 speakers of other languages
- 38 participants in Workplace English at Sterlingwear of Boston
- After School Program has provided academic enrichment to 40 Limited English Proficient students at the Lilla G. Frederick Middle School in Dorchester
- Timothy Smith Learning Center has provided computer instruction to over 164 people and the lab has been utilized by over 150 people this year

Maria's Story: Learning English provides the pathway to success in the workplace

Maria makes the coats that keep



us warm in the winter months.
She takes great pride in her work and stands out as a model employee at her job at Sterlingwear of Boston. The biggest challenge Maria faced in 2008 was her confidence in speaking and writing English.

Luckily her employer recognized Maria's potential, and the potential of 38 fellow workers for whom English was their second language. With the support of the Massachusetts Department of Education and Sterlingwear of Boston, La Alianza Hispana began providing on-site Workplace English classes for

Maria and her fellow employees in January 2008.

"When Sterlingwear brought in La Alianza Hispana, I knew this wasn't just a job, they opened the door to achieve the American dream." Maria added, "I feel more confident communicating with my managers. They have encouraged me to take more training in order to get a promotion. The road to improving my English skills has no end. There is a long way for me to go but now I feel really motivated and supported."

La Alianza Hispana's Leadership in Action





In 2008, La Alianza Hispana strengthened our organization in many ways, including exercising and developing our leadership. From recruiting new talent, to building the capacity of our staff, La Alianza Hispana has become a more fit organization this year.

La Alianza Hispana's Board of Directors welcomed two new board members in 2008. Both adventure-seeking Latinas, Alejandra and Gabriela bring new energy and talent to La Alianza's leadership as well as a wonderful spirit of commitment to the Latino community. Gabriela Mendoza, Esq., La Alianza Hispana's Treasurer, brings legal and financial talent. We are also tapping her real estate expertise to help La Alianza Hispana maximize our capital assets. Gabby's work ethic can be summed up by this motto:

"work hard, play hard and give back to the community." When she's not running her law practice or helping La Alianza Hispana, you can find her doing things like white water rafting, hiking or traveling. In 2009, Gabby

Alejandra St. Guillen, brings a diverse background in education as well as community and political organizing experience. Born and raised in Boston's Mission Hill area, Alejandra first entered the political arena as the Director of Constituent Services for Senator Dianne Wilkerson. In April, she joined ¿Oíste?, the Latino Civic Engagement Initiative, as the Program Manager for the Initiative for Diversity in Civic Leadership, a 16- week training program for current and aspiring candidates, appointees, public servants and campaign staff of color. Alejandra holds a B.A. in Economics and African-American Studies from Wesleyan University and a Masters in Education from the City College of New York. In 2009, Alejandra will be running the 2009 Boston Marathon on behalf of La Alianza Hispana! (Click here to support Alejandra in her goal to run 26.2 miles and raise \$5,000!)

La Alianza Hispana's management team is stronger than ever this year. La Alianza Hispana hired Rita Lara, our first full-time Director of Development. Aixa Beauchamp continued to provide expert consulting around philanthropy and program evaluation. Beatriz Stratter, Director of Finance, is enrolled in a Non-Profit Administration and Finance Program which is a joint venture between Suffolk University and the Human Service Providers Council. And Josiane Martinez, Marketing and Community Relations Manager, graduated from

the National Hispanic Leadership Institute and the Boston-based Initiative for Diversity in Civic Leadership Program.

Executive Director Janet Collazo was invited by Boston University to participate in two professional development programs: InnerCity Entrepreneurs and Link Consulting Day. These two trainings helped La Alianza Hispana develop a business plan for our Mental Health Clinic and a performance evaluation plan for human resources.
