La Alianza Hispana's Accomplishments:
2013and Beyond

#### LA ALIANZA HISPANA - NUMERO UNO

La Alianza Hispana's staff and *Cuidate* program won FIRST PRIZE for the "BEST FLOAT" at the recent Puerto Rican Festival held on July 28<sup>th</sup> at Government Center in Boston. This prize caps off a year of turbulence and uncertainty while symbolizing recovery and determination to restore La Alianza Hispana to its long-time leadership position in the Latino community.

When I became Interim Executive Director in February we were facing a huge fiscal and organizational emergency. The agency, with a \$2.5 million budget was struggling with more than \$250,000 in debt; had lost a \$295,000 state grant; was employing its third executive director within a four-month span; and was questioning its very survival.

I am overjoyed to report that La Alianza Hispana is on the road to recovery. Our three core services (Senior Adult Health; Teen Pregnancy/HIV prevention; Public Health) are projected breaking even operationally. Administrative costs have been reduced by 2/3. We have raised \$60,000 in unrestricted funds. Planning for the annual Women of Courage event is going well with a \$50,000 profit goal in sight.

La Alianza is making significant leadership changes. Three new Members have joined the Board of Directors. A permanent Executive Director, Marisol Amaya, has been promoted from within and will assume her new duties on September 27<sup>th</sup>.

We have been accepted by the City of Boston's Office of New Bostonians program for an important capacity-building initiative over the next year. We also now have a new financial partner: Massachusetts Growth Capital Corporation, which is supplying critical bridge/gap funding. Both of these groups will help us with future planning. We will be leveraging our real estate for re-organization while re-structuring/eliminating our mortgage debt. In fact, if our forecasting proves accurate, *all* debt will be removed from our books.

All of these activities represent progress. However, there are still many challenging obstacles to overcome. I think momentum and commitment are on our side. Our continuing, and

growing, partnerships with our many friends, colleagues and partners, along with an incredibly dedicated and loyal staff, who have made huge sacrifices throughout, will ensure that La Alianza will not only survive, but will grow and thrive for the benefit of our current and future clients.
